LEARNING OUR LAKES

(part 2 in a series)

As mentioned in the last newsletter, our retention ponds are simply collection vessels for storm drainage, and as such, are stagnant. The Lake Doctors tell us that several types of weeds and algae will thrive in this environment, which is why they are hired to treat our ponds.

Any chemical you use to turn your lawn green will also turn our lakes green. The weeds in the lakes are plants, and algae needs nitrogen to bloom. Your fertilizer contains nitrogen and other nutrients which are not only good for your lawn, but also good for the weeds and algae in the lakes. Please keep fertilizer away from the last 10 feet of your lawn which abuts a lake. Rains will wash this fertilizer into the lake.

And please, DO NOT PUT YOUR GRASS CLIPPINGS in the ponds or down storm drains! Decaying material provides a higher nutrient level for the weeds and algae, promoting growth.


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OLD APPLIANCES

ENTRY LEVEL WORK

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To this end, we are planning an irrigation system which will cover areas around the development on Ashley Melisse and Arkenstone. This will allow us to grow and keep quality grass along the streets which border Sterling Ridge. Once in place, we will also be able to do more planting at the entry ways.

All this work requires electricity, and we are of course planning on JEA-provided power at both entrances. Once we have the necessary power for irrigation, we will also have power on tap to install lighting at the entrances.

At this point, we are still in the planning stages, getting preliminary estimates, after which, we may have to modify specifications in order to make the projects affordable.

But the palms are bought and paid for, and should prove a little harder to steal then our last landscaping adventure at that corner.

BOARD COLLECTS THOUSANDS THE HARD WAY

If you have been following the stories in these newsletters, you are aware that the board has filed numerous liens on Sterling Ridge properties, and even filed foreclosure on 8 homes in the neighborhood in order to collect back association dues.

As of this writing, of the eight foreclosures, Sterling Ridge collected on seven, and unless money is received very soon, may actually take title of one home here.

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It is very regrettable that the Board has had to resort to these measures to collect dues. When dues

are collected in this manner, they are accompanied by hundreds or thousands of dollars in legal fees, court costs, etc.
